You have already made valiant strides in finding the claim/thematic statement in a text; however, we still have some areas of improvements as it relates to creating coherent and concise analysis of what we have read. Below, I have attached strong examples of student work. They are not perfect, but they do some things quite well. As we read in class, be sure to highlight, take note of what is done well, and be sure to approach this week's rhetorical precis with these changes in mind.

Biggest tips:

- Stay in present tense
- Use powerful verbs (no "says")
- Use embedded textual evidence to show how the author conveys his/her point
- Use "in order to" statement in third sentence to show the effect of the evidence
- Think critically in your last sentence: connect to rhetorical appeals, audience or tone
- Only use 4 sentences!!!! No more!!

In "The Opposite of Loneliness", Marina Keegan emphasizes that parental involvement is not always a good thing. Keegan describes her unpleasant and embarrassing experiences with her mother, who was obsessed with Marina's disease, explaining how her mother even "left her job" in order to "raise" Marina and her brothers; in fact she even admits that she feels "guilty" about what her disease has done and cause her mom to do. Marina writes about these repulsive moments of her childhood where she felt "guilty" for all her disease had made her mom do and become in order to demonstrate that parental guidance of how to deal with a disease can negatively affect both parents and the child who is ill. Keegan addresses the fact that the reality of what a Celiac patient might want to believe is not true when she says "It's just food. It's not a big deal." multiple times in her memoir and then later proving the truth is what that matters, having a illness is important to be taken care of and needed family guidance but also not.

She does this by using pathos to make the readers feel sorry for her and concludes the story with her being self sufficient this makes the reader know that it is possible to overcome anything.

Marina Keegan in "The Opposite of Loneliness" (memoir) argues that too much reliance on another person will weaken one's self-reliance. In her memoir she first shows how her mother would keep her gluten free diet for her, and then by telling how once she got to college how she often failed to keep a gluten free diet because she had no reason to be worried about not keeping it. She does this in order to show how she had no reasoning to keep her gluten free diet, especially because her "physical symptoms have largely subsided" (164). She connects with her audience by showing her youthful optimism (such as "I'm young. I'm fine") and her youthful worries ("There were new things to worry about: how to play beer pong without beer, how not to French-kiss a boy after his late-night pizza") in order to connect to her young audience.

In "My Beloved World", Sonia Sotomayor implies that parents who are not involved in their children's lives could have a negative impact on their children's future because it is very difficult to manage life without guidance from parents (Sotomayor). Sotomayor conveys her message by starting the story with a family fight, by the first time she fainted in the church, by going to the doctors/hospitals frequently, and by illustrating that she had become independent the moment she gave herself a shot. She reveals her sorrows and experiences in order to encourage the people who are struggling with diabetes to survive the world even if their parents are not there to help them. Furthermore, Sotomayor's purpose for writing the story is to show the helpless children that if she is capable of surviving and having a bright future, then they can do the same; therefore, by using her suffering and sadness she convinced people that having an illness is not a prophecy, but instead, an obstacle that requires courage to overcome it.
